These students face unique challenges, including gaps in their education and the effects of trauma from war, poverty, or unsafe living conditions.

Passionate about fostering resilience and academic success, Carla specializes in creating inclusive, trauma-informed learning environments that empower students to overcome barriers and achieve their potential. In addition to classroom teaching, Carla facilitates professional development workshops to fellow educators, sharing strategies for working effectively with diverse learners and addressing the complex needs of students from refugee backgrounds.
